Gender equality



Expert's **report**

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The Sustainable Development Goals seek to alter the course of the 21st century on a large scale. Since gender inequality constitutes one of the history's most persistent and widespread forms of injustice, eliminating it will call for one of history's biggest movements for change. Gender equality is not only a fundamental human right, but a necessary foundation for a peaceful and sustainable world. Therefore, achieving gender equality and women's empowerment is a stand-alone goal— Goal 5—of the SDGs.

Gender inequality persists worldwide, depriving women and girls of their basic rights and opportunities. Achieving gender equality and the empowerment of women and girls will require more vigorous efforts, including legal frameworks, to counter deeply rooted gender-based discrimination that often results from patriarchal attitudes and related social norms.

Intimate partner violence against women and girls is widespread all over the world. On the basis of data from 2005 to 2016 for 87 countries, 19 per cent of women between 15 and 49 years of age said they had experienced physical and/or sexual violence by an intimate partner in the 12 months prior to the survey. In the most extreme cases, such violence can lead to death.

Harmful practices, such as child marriage and female genital mutilation, continue to rob women and girls of equal opportunities. The numbers are staggering— at least 200 million women and girls have undergone FGM and over 750 million women and girls alive today were married before their 18th birthday.

Women and girls perform loads of unpaid care and domestic work which prevents them from being engaged in other activities. The average amount of time spent on unpaid domestic and care work is more than threefold higher for women than men, according to survey data from 83 countries and areas.

Globally, women's participation in single or lower houses of national parliaments reached 23.4 per cent in 2017, just 10 percentage points higher than in 2000. Such slow

progress suggests that stronger political commitment and more ambitious measures and quotas are needed to boost women's political participation and empowerment.

Just over half of women between 15 and 49 years of age who are married or in union make their own decisions about consensual sexual relations and use of contraceptives and health services. That statistic is based on available data from around 2012 for 45 countries, 43 of which are in developing regions.

There are still huge inequalities in the labor market in some regions, with women systematically denied equal access to jobs. In the third quarter of 2016, the employment rate for men stood at 77.4%, while the employment rate for women reached an all-time high level of 65.5%.

Thus, we can see that women face obstacles in exercising their rights. Goal 5 aims to eliminate all forms of discrimination and violence against women in the public and private spheres and to undertake reforms to give women equal rights to economic resources and access to ownership of property.

Here is the list of targets, which are crucial to accelerate sustainable development:

- a) End all forms of discrimination against all women and girls everywhere
- b) Eliminate all forms of violence against all women and girls in the public and private spheres, including trafficking and sexual and other types of exploitation
- c) Eliminate all harmful practices, such as child, early and forced marriage and female genital mutilation
- d) Recognize and value unpaid care and domestic work through the provision of public services, infrastructure and social protection policies and the promotion of shared responsibility within the household and the family as nationally appropriate
- e) Ensure women's full and effective participation and equal opportunities for leadership at all levels of decision-making in political, economic and public life
- f) Ensure universal access to sexual and reproductive health and reproductive rights as agreed in accordance with the Programme of Action of the International Conference on

Population and Development and the Beijing Platform for Action and the outcome documents of their review conferences

- g) Undertake reforms to give women equal rights to economic resources, as well as access to ownership and control over land and other forms of property, financial services, inheritance and natural resources, in accordance with national laws
- h) Enhance the use of enabling technology, in particular information and communications technology, to promote the empowerment of women
- i) Adopt and strengthen sound policies and enforceable legislation for the promotion of gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls at all levels
